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What I Learned from Reading the Biography of Empress Menen

A Letter to My Christian Brothers and Sisters:

When I first opened The Biography of Empress
Menen, I did not expect to be moved to tears. Like
many Christians, I had long heard that Haile
Selassie was regarded by Rastafari as "God
incarnate," and, truth be told, I found that claim
difficult—perhaps even blasphemous. But page by
page, the story of the Emperor and his Empress
began to soften my skepticism. I discovered that
God often hides the sacred in the simple, the divine
in the daily, the eternal in the earthly. Through their
lives, I saw how the Almighty can step into human
form not to demand worship, but to demonstrate
how to live—with humility, honor, and unwavering
covenant.

What moved me most was learning that the young Ras Tafari Makonnen—soon to be crowned Haile Selassie I, King of Kings, Lord of Lords, Conquering Lion of the Tribe of Judah—did something unheard of in royal protocol:

He broke rank and married a woman who had been twice divorced and already a mother of four.

To the world, this was scandal. To me, it was revelation. Here was a man raised in the strictest royal and religious tradition, choosing love over law, mercy over image. He not only married her; he coronated her beside him—Empress Menen Asfaw—bestowing on her the same crown, the same authority, the same divine recognition.

It was as though God Himself was reminding us that covenant is greater than convention, and that true kingship is measured not by control, but by companionship.




When Leonard Percival Howell, the first Rastaman, proclaimed Haile Selassie I as the Living God, he was ridiculed, beaten, and locked away in Bellevue Hospital — labeled insane by the same legal system that later honored colonial monarchs and foreign laws. But Howell's "madness" was insight. He saw what empire feared — that divine justice could not be contained within the British Crown or colonial lawbooks. He built a community, Pinnacle, based on African unity, equality, and self-reliance — later crushed by the government."



Marcus Mosiah Garvey

Marcus Mosiah Garvey declared that no man is above the law. For daring to demand accountability from those in power, Garvey was charged with sedition — imprisoned not for violence, but for courage. He warned that when judges, lawyers, and police officers break the law, it corrupts the soul of the nation. Garvey saw what many refused to: that the colonial spirit survives wherever truth is punished and justice is postponed. Garvey's imprisonment marked the beginning of Jamaica's moral decline — a fall from divine governance to political theater.

In Jamaica today that divine covenant is still being broken. Ask Mr. Lancelott Watson, a disabled elder and human rights defender whose life became a testimony of what happens when those sworn to uphold the law become its violators. READ ON>>>



Empress Menen Asfaw, The Covenant of Kings

Long before the birth of kingdoms and constitutions, there was a covenant — a divine agreement between the Creator and His people. That covenant was sealed in the time of King Solomon, the Wise, whose reign in Jerusalem represented the perfect harmony between spiritual law and temporal governance. When the Queen of Sheba journeyed from the mountains of Ethiopia to witness his wisdom, she came not for gold or alliance, but to behold how justice was administered. Their meeting was not only historic; it was prophetic.

From their sacred union came Menelik I, the son who would return to Ethiopia carrying the Ark of the Covenant — the very symbol of divine law, justice, and truth.

In him, the covenant between Heaven and Earth was preserved — passed down through the ages to their royal descendants: Emperor Haile Selassie I and Empress Menen Asfaw.

The Sacred Union of Empress Menen and Haile Selassie



When Empress Menen Asfaw stood beside Haile Selassie I, their union was more than marriage — it was prophecy fulfilled. She embodied the Queen of Sheba reborn: grace balanced by discipline, compassion tempered with courage. He embodied Solomon renewed: wisdom sharpened by divine duty.

When Words Become Weapons



Trench Town- The Birthplace of Reggae Music Babylon is not a distant myth. It is the system we live in — a covenant broken between state and citizen, between power and people, between ruler and the ruled. Babylon is when constitutions promise dignity but police deliver brutality.

When authorities banned songs, monitored performers, and suppressed concerts — not because of obscenity — but because those songs revealed open violations of covenant — that is when we see the true birth of reggae as spiritual resistance.
